Graduate of Imperial Alexander University Augusta Makaroff 1908 Finland: Grand Dutchy Imperial Russia till 1917



Master's degree in Finnish and Fenno-Ugrian languages 1908: 233 Master's degrees - **29 women** (population 3 million)

What empowered these young ladies? Gender equality in political rights

1906: Finnish women the first in the world: right to vote and stand for election

1907: 200 MPs elected - **19 women**

Today Finland excels with Sweden in European Gender Equality Index

In all other sectors: Work, Money, Power, Knowledge, Health...

But not: Academia and innovation

Equality embedded in Finnish legislation Gender quota since 1995



Bodies exerting DIRECT or INDIRECT power over public funds Minimum of 40% of minority gender

To raise quality of decisions by diversity of decision makers

All public sectors of society

Research Councils - at least 40% of female members Encouragement to apply, gender equality plan in proposals, monitoring

Womens share on 4-step career path, 2016 (2013)

PhD candidate 47% (45%)

Post-doc 49% (47%)

Lecturer 47% (47%)

Professor 29% (26%) – EU average 24%

Low share of women professors >> women underrepresented

Decision made by Parliament's Chancellery Committee chaired by the Speaker Based on panel's recommendations

First awardee in 2017 Hele Savin

For nanostructure-based method to construct solar cells with high capacity even in the North where the sun shines from a low angle
